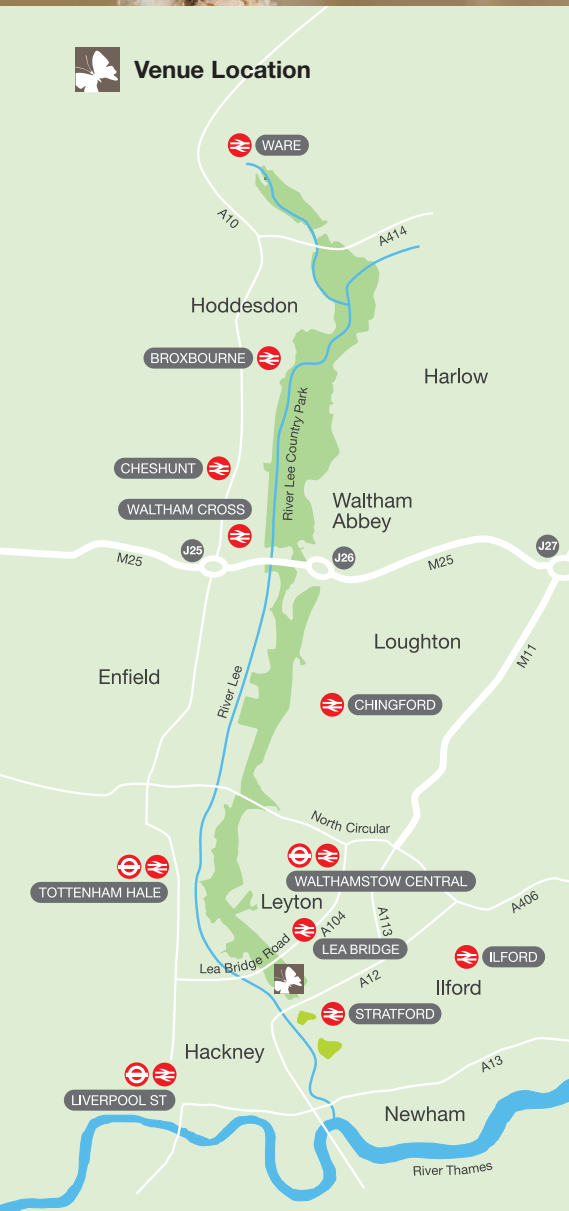




Venue Location



Excellent example of industrial regeneration

This old industrial site is now a haven for wildlife. Originally built by the East London Water Works Company it demonstrates how previous industrial areas can become valuable habitats for wildlife. The Middlesex Filterbeds were built soon after the 1852 cholera outbreak as part of the effort to make sure such epidemics were never repeated.

This site is important for birds and more than 200 plant species have been recorded here.

Adoption of this site would support the land management and community access.

Facilities

- Area where marquees can be erected
- Toilets and café serving hot and cold food nearby – five minute walk
- Meetings rooms available nearby – five minute walk
- Car parking for up to 40 cars – five minute walk
- Transport links: main line train station 10 minute walk and easy access from A12

Additional corporate activities available (charges apply)

- Guided tours of the site with a Ranger
- Team building activities such as Scavenger Hunt, Human Knot, The Mine Field or The Egg Drop
- Catering available such as buffets and BBQs
- A range of events can be undertaken
