### **LEE VALLEY REGIONAL PARK ACT 1966 SECTION 14 ADOPTION OF THE PARK DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK AREA PROPOSALS FOR AREA1- EAST INDIA DOCK BASIN TO QUEEN ELIZABETH OLYMPIC PARK**

**Presented by the Head of Planning and Strategic Partnerships**

#### **SUMMARY**

The purpose of this report is to seek the Authority's adoption of the Park Development Framework Proposals for Area 1. The Proposals cover the southern-most area of the Regional Park from East India Dock Basin through to the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park.

Detailed Proposals for Area 1 have been through public consultation and the revised proposals were considered by the Lower Lee Valley Regeneration and Planning Committee in May (LLV/167/15). These were approved with two further minor amendments and referred to the full Authority for adoption. The Authority is therefore asked to adopt the Area 1 Proposals set out in Appendix A to this report in accordance with Section 14 of the Lee Valley Regional Park Act 1966. These will replace the Part 2 proposals contained in the Park Plan 2000.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

**Members Approve:** (1) the draft proposals for Area 1 East India Dock Basin to Queen Elizabeth Park (attached at Appendix A to this report) as the Authority's formal Proposals in accordance with Section 14 of the Lee Valley Regional Park Act 1966.

#### **BACKGROUND**

- 1 The preparation of the Park Development Framework (PDF) commenced in 2007 and comprises a suite of documents which have been adopted since 2008. The Authority adopted the Thematic Proposals in 2011. These set out the Authority's aspiration for future development and management on a Park wide thematic basis. This document is a companion document to the previously agreed and published Vision, Aims and Principles.

- 2 To satisfy the requirements of Section 14 of the Lee Valley Regional Park Act 1966 (the Act) and replace the Park Plan (2000) more detailed location specific proposals are required for all land within the Park as part of the Park Development Framework (PDF). This is being undertaken through a phased process; the Area proposals for the section of the Park between Ruckholt Road and Coppermill Lane, Area 2, the 'Three Marshes' was adopted in January 2012 and areas 3, 4 and 5, the 'Waterlands' adopted on 25 April 2013.
- 3 Area 1 forms the southernmost section of the Park and comprises the historic East India Dock and Three Mills Island, Bow Creek Ecology Park, and significant parts of the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park (QEOP). The creation of the QEOP has transformed the northern part of Area 1. New parklands now extend through the Regional Park from Hackney Marsh (Area 2) to the Greenway and provide the context for the Legacy landmarks such as the Lee Valley VeloPark, The Stadium and Aquatics Centre, with the Lee Valley Hockey and Tennis Centre occupying the northern most part of this area.
- 4 Linear extensions along the towpaths of the Limehouse Cut, Hertford Union Canal and waterways within the Bow Back Rivers network including sections of the River Lea and Lee Navigation connect the Park with adjoining communities within Tower Hamlets, Newham and Hackney. The Greenway provides a dedicated cycle and pedestrian route crossing through from west to east connecting the Park to East Ham.
- 5 Public consultation on the Area 1 Proposals took place between 26 November 2014 and 21 January 2015. The comments received and officer responses were reported by way of an appendix included within a report to the Lower Lee Valley Regeneration and Planning Committee on 14 May 2015 (Paper LLV/167/15). In its consideration of the draft proposals the Committee Members required two minor amendments covering a specific reference to the Authority seeking Section 106 contributions to fund improvements to East India Dock Basin and revisions to the route network along the Lea to account for the Lea Pathway. They agreed the proposals should be referred to the Authority for adoption under Section 14 of the Act.
- 6 Appendix A to this report contains the final version of the Proposals for Area 1 including a context section for this area of the Park and a plan indicating the Proposal areas. Appendix B to this report includes comments from interested bodies and Appendix C to this report identifies the area and sub areas. A detailed set of plans is available in the Committee office.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS**

- 7 The development of the adopted Thematic Proposals from which many of the Area 1 Proposals were derived was informed by a Sustainable Environmental Appraisal.

## **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

- 8 The delivery of these proposals will have financial implications for the Authority as funding is sought from the Authority's capital programme and from other partners. As with all proposals for capital and revenue expenditure within the Authority's budget and Capital Programme, identification for areas of investment does not in itself commit the Authority to spend. All proposals will be subject to Member approval as part of a detailed business plan and dependent on

available and identified resources at the time.

## **HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS**

- 9 There are no human resource implications arising directly from the recommendations in this report.

## **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS**

- 10 The draft proposals have been developed in accordance with section 14 of the Lee Valley Regional Park Act 1966. Once adopted they will replace the Park Plan 2000's (Part 2) proposals for this part of the Regional Park. The Authority's adopted proposals will be included in the Local Development Framework of the respective riparian boroughs as local planning authorities which is a requirement under Section 14. However their inclusion does not signify that the local planning authority agrees with them.

## **RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS**

- 11 Adoption of these proposals gives significant weight to the Authority's role to develop and manage the Park, secure new investment and defend the Regional Park from non-Park compatible related development in accordance with the provisions of the Act. All proposals will be subject to available and identified resources.

## **EQUALITY IMPLICATIONS**

- 12 There are no equality implications arising directly from the recommendations in this report.

## **Appendix A Park Development Framework Final Draft Area 1 Proposals November 2015**

### **Area 1 East India Dock Basin to Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park**

#### **Context Section**

Area 1 comprises parts of the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park (QEOP), narrow sections of the River Lee Navigation and River Lea, an area centred on Three Mills, the Bow Creek Ecology Park and at its southernmost point East India Dock Basin (EIDB). Linear towpaths along the Hertford Union Canal and Limehouse Cut, which connects the Regional Park with the River Thames at Limehouse Basin, and the Greenway, a raised foot and cycle path are included within the Regional Park. The River Lea, although not within the Regional Park south of Three Mills also joins with the Thames just to the east of East India Dock Basin. The northern boundary of Area 1 is defined by the A12 and Ruckholt Road and the A106, south of Hackney Marshes and Wick Community Woodland.

The creation of the QEOP has transformed what was a heavily urbanised industrial area with a new leisure and sporting landscape set within a parkland context. What was once known as Stratford Marsh within the Regional Park is now largely the site of the Athletics Stadium and new residential and mixed use neighbourhoods are being developed alongside the eastern and western boundaries of the Regional Park. Although the transportation hub at Stratford is a major asset in terms of public access to the Regional Park together with other underground and DLR stations, the major transport networks, both road and rail still fragment and sever the area. Further south the Park exists as three separate sites set amongst a network of linear waterways, towpaths, and footpaths, surrounded by industrial sites, large areas of public housing interspersed with small to medium scale businesses and Canary Wharf which provides a backdrop to Bow Creek and East India Dock Basin.

#### **Key Resources and Special Features**

Important landscape features include the diverse parkland landscape mosaic created by the QEOP, prominent iconic landmarks such as the Arcelor Mittal Orbit Tower, the Lee Valley Velodrome, the Athletics Stadium and Aquatics Centre and an extensive

post-industrial landscape associated with East India Dock Basin, the Abbey Mills Pumping Station and the House and Clock Mills at Three Mills. The new parklands extend the open valley floor from Hackney Marshes south to the Greenway, although some of these open spaces lie just beyond the Regional Park boundary. They provide the context for the major sporting and leisure venues such as the Lee Valley VeloPark and the Lee Valley Hockey and Tennis Centre.

Key resources such as the waterways remain, and within the QEOP their accessibility and setting is much improved with the addition of attractive waterside paths, art installations and natural play. Further south there are proposals to open up access along the remaining length of the River Lea with the delivery of the Leaway and associated Lea River Park. This will enhance connections between the outlying ‘islands’ of the Regional Park at Three Mills, Bow Creek and East India Dock Basin and the QEOP.

These sites offer a complex and layered landscape of built and water related heritage, and post-industrial ecology reflecting the different phases of past industrial activity mainly using the water resources. Three Mills situated at Bromley-by-Bow is designated a Conservation Area with two listed buildings (the Grade I House Mill and the Grade II listed Clock Mill) and various other structures of historic interest. Part of the open space on the adjoining site Mill Meads is also within the Park and offers good views of the Abbey Mills Pumping Station, another important historic building within the area. South of Three Mills lies Bow Creek, a small strip of land caught between the meanders of the River Lea which has been restored and is managed as an ecology park. East India Dock Basin sits adjacent to the River Thames and has been managed as a wildlife refuge and is designated a Site of Interest for nature conservation (SINC) Grade 1. Issues of siltation within the basin and the need to improve access and interpret heritage features will require further work on site to improve facilities for visitors and enhance the wetland habitat.

Views out across this area of the Park and beyond over large parts of London are varied and extensive, especially of the Thames from East India Dock Basin and across the QEOP and from elevated positions such as the Greenway.

### Opportunities for visitors

The QEOP offers an exciting range of sporting, leisure and recreational opportunities both in terms of specific sporting provision and through a variety of events, arts and educational programmes. Those venues operated by the Lee Valley Leisure Trust on behalf of the Authority are seeking to cater for a wide audience and range of abilities. The Lee Valley Hockey & Tennis Centre is to

be developed as a regional hub for disability tennis, and the new hockey pitches will be available for individual, community, club and elite use. The legacy development programme at the Lee Valley Velopark is aimed at increasing participation for people new to the sport as well as cyclists on performance pathways. Play provision within Area 1 is offered both within the QEOP (Tumbling Bay and the Outdoor Rooms) and at the natural play facility 'Wild Kingdom' at Three Mills. A variety of spaces provide for informal recreation from the QEOP parklands to the important heritage sites at Three Mills and EIDB. Waterside open space is also important within this part of the Regional Park especially where it can be accessed from adjoining linear pathways.

Visitor facilities such as cafes, shelter, toilets and information are well provided within the QEOP and have set the standard for the enhancement of facilities elsewhere in this area. Proposals recognise the need to work with stakeholders to improve provision at EIDB for example and to enhance the range of visitor facilities at Three Mills where the House Mill and Miller's House attraction and café are well located adjacent to a network of waterside cycle and pedestrian routes.

Pedestrian and cycle access linked into rail and underground networks and stations ensures there is a high potential that visitors will use public transport to visit the Regional Park. More work is needed to clearly sign connecting routes between underground stations such as Bow Road and the areas of the Regional Park, particularly in the south of the Area 1, where severance is a hindrance to people's enjoyment of the Regional Park. Waterside paths, towpaths, and other routes such as the Greenway provide some interesting walking and cycling networks for visitors and proposals are supportive of new routes such as the Leaway and Quietway routes which will pass through and adjacent to the Regional Park.

Existing sites such as Bow Creek Ecology Park and new facilities within the QEOP present opportunities to enhance the education and learning offer within Area 1, by introducing new programmes and expanding the scope of existing services. This will require investment in new facilities such as direct access between Canning Town underground and DLR station and Bow Creek and the provision of dedicated space for educational use in the sporting venues. Proposals seek to address these points. Volunteer activity makes a positive contribution to Area 1 through both the LLDC activities within the QEOP and the Authority's volunteer programme. The QEOP mobility scheme is a good best practice example.

East India Dock Basin and Bow Creek Ecology Park offer opportunities to get close to nature as do the newly created wetlands on the QEOP. Walking or boating along the waterways and towpaths provide a more informal means of enjoying nature and proposals have recognised the important connectivity and wildlife corridor that the waterways provide.

### **Adopted guiding principles guiding these proposals**

The Authority's draft proposals for each of these areas are designed to address the issues identified above and are based on the Authority's adopted (July 2010) guiding principles for the future development and management of the Regional Park. These are:

- Partnership work – recognising that many of the proposals can only be delivered through the collective efforts of a range of partners, stakeholders and landowners.
- Regional Value – assessing the range of benefits that any particular facility or activity within the Park delivers to the people of Essex, Hertfordshire and London.
- Multi-function and synergy – developing proposals which can be used to harness competing demands.
- Flexibility – the design and management of facilities and open spaces of the park in a way which responds to changing needs and demands
- Sustainability – ensuring that new development does not prejudice the lives of future generations.

**Support the delivery of the QEOP Park Mobility service to include a mobility buggy, sighted guides and the hire of mobility scooters and manual wheelchairs.** Expansion of the service to cover Sunday and summer school holidays.

#### **Greenway**

Protect, promote and enhance the Greenway as an attractive green cycle and pedestrian route and future Quietway through the Regional Park from Hackney to Newham. Work with stakeholders to ensure connections onto the Greenway from adjoining communities are maintained and signed, especially in the south east and from within East Ham.

#### **Hertford Union Canal**

Safeguard pedestrian and cycle access into the Regional Park from the Hertford Union Canal towpath, promoting direct links between the Regional Park, QEOP and Victoria Park

#### **Visitor Facilities**

Support the LLDC's programme of investment and enhancement in visitor facilities throughout QEOP and work with the LLDC to secure preferential room hire arrangements and cross promotion for the Authority.

Ensure visitor facilities at the sporting and leisure venues within the Regional Park cater for the general Regional Park visitors and education sessions as well as those people using the venues and maintain provision for core services for example shelter, café, toilets, staff presence and Regional Park information. Space for educational sessions to be provided as part of these core facilities.

**Support the provision of visitor facilities at the View Tube adjacent to Greenway to complement facilities elsewhere in**

#### **Play**

Safeguard and support the use of open spaces for informal recreation and play within the Regional Park and the ongoing maintenance of the high quality outdoor play areas at Tumbling Bay and those adjacent to the Regional Park between the City Mill and Waterworks Rivers.

#### **1.A.1**

Conserve and enhance the biodiversity of the waterways, Greenway and parklands. Work with stakeholders to deliver and monitor the QEOP Legacy BAP (2013), the London BAP and the Lee Valley BAP (2000) and the relevant species and habitat plans included in these documents.

Protect the River Lea and Lee Navigation as metropolitan areas of importance for nature conservation and the connectivity these ecological corridors provide between Area 1 and the rest of the Park to the north. Ensure ecological connectivity is enhanced between Wick Woodland and Old Ford Lock as part of the future management of the Canal Park.

## **Flora and Fauna**

Work with the LIDC and other stakeholders to protect, manage and monitor key habitats created within the QEOP and the Regional Park (as defined in QEOP BAP and Lee Valley BAP):

- Built environment; including living roofs such as on the Hockey and Tennis Centre, 'living wall' at the Lee Valley VeloPark and bird boxes throughout QEOP (including Starling, House Sparrow and Black Redstart boxes on the Lee Valley Hockey and Tennis Centre)
- Brownfield habitat established as part of the Mountain bike & BMX track which provides a variety of species mixes and trees, incorporating Toadflax strips to encourage the rare Toadflax Brocade Moth.
- Species rich grassland – occurs throughout the Regional Park and QEOP providing important habitat for invertebrates
- Trees and scrub –managed to maintain canopy diversity and shelter to encourage nesting birds, insects and, mammals including bats.
- Reedbed - adjacent to water provides habitats for invertebrates, fish, Water Voles and birds.
- Standing open water, swamp and marsh – includes two Frog Ponds created in the North Park (totalling 0.4ha) and swales created alongside the mountain bike course providing habitat for invertebrates and amphibians.
- Wet Woodland – adjacent to rivers and streams. Combined with dry areas of trees and scrub to create opportunities for nesting birds, bats, reptiles and invertebrates.
- Rivers – natural and artificially engineered waterways provide important habitat foraging areas and linking corridors for a range of wildlife.
- Parks, squares and amenity spaces – which form green corridors linking other habitats

Work with venue and open spaces staff to develop further volunteering opportunities at new venues and locations and support community involvement and engagement through volunteering and other community related events and activities.

##### **Landscape & Heritage**

###### **Landscape**

Protect, maintain and continue to enhance the high quality landscape within the QEOP and Regional Park to meet both the operational requirements of the sporting venues and to provide an interesting and diverse landscape experience for the visitor.

Work with stakeholders to ensure landscape management maintains and protects views of the new venues, their associated landscapes, landmarks, watercourses and bridges, including views from and along the Greenway

Maintain and enhance the parkland edge along the boundary of the QEOP and Regional Park whilst accommodating good access, permeability and views throughout. Ensure the development platforms within the QEOP are designed to respond positively to the Regional Park and the QEOP.

**Work with stakeholders to protect the heritage interest and value of built structures such as the Grade I House Mill, the Grade II listed Clock Mill and the waterside spaces within the Three Mills and the adjacent Sugar House Lane Conservation Areas. Protect views to the House Mill and Clock House and to the Abbey Mills Pumping Station (Grade II listed) on Mill Meads.**

**Support the existing guided tours of the House Mill and encourage greater public access to the listed buildings at Three Mills, working with Thames Water to enable visitor access to the Abbey Mills Pumping Station as part of a wider heritage trail of the area. Work with LLDC and Lea River Park stakeholders on the curatorial strategy for the Lea River Park as part of the development of heritage trails and events in the area.**

#### **House Mill**

**Continue to support the work of the River Lea Tidal Mill Trust to protect the site and enable the public to access the heritage. Project work should aim to establish a heritage based visitor hub at the Miller's House and the delivery of the House Mill Project; to restore some of the mill machinery to demonstrate the workings of the site.**



**Contamination**

Carry out further feasibility work relating to the management, regrading and removal of silt deposits in the basin at East India Dock. Appraisal and assessment of the works required to inform the future development of the site as a visitor hub and gateway to the Regional Park, and to take full account of its biodiversity and heritage resources.

**Land**

The impact on the Regional Park of new residential and industrial development to be minimised through encouraging high standards of design and land management. Development should respond to heritage assets such as Three Mills and the existing grain, pattern, scale and building heights and avoid breaching existing horizons and dominating the water frontages. Appropriate set-backs from the water's edge will be sought alongside the towpath and other waterside paths; development should enhance expression and presence of the watercourses.

A public footpath is a route which walkers have a common law right to use without suffering a nuisance, and cyclists are a nuisance. I remember the towpath as it was 40 years ago. It used to be a lovely footpath, giving peaceful, relaxing riverside walks, locally or to outer or inner London, and we were lucky to have such a lovely footpath. 

		Thank you for inviting comments on the draft Area 1 Planning Document. This is a valuable exercise and I wouldn't demur from any of the principles and proposals you include in the plan. My disappointment is that it tends to go by in a blur – it is difficult to get a handle here on what really matters, and where priorities for action lie, in this era of drastically reduced resources. Specifically I think you give insufficient weight to two related things: the very distinctive strategic contribution this stretch makes to the park as a whole, and its immediate hinterland, and the very remarkable strategic opportunity which the Olympic Park has created to raise awareness and interest in the river Lea, and in the valley to the north and south. Thinking through the significance of these two issues prompts a series of related priorities which help to give shape to the programme.	Noted.
